Murrabit Community News

Murrabit and District recently celebrated 100 years since the Murrabit Township was established, the British migrant settlers arrival to take up land across the district, and the official opening of the Kerang-Murrabit Railway. It was wonderful to see so many people return to our little town to help celebrate this historic occasion. The weather was superb for market day on Saturday 5 as well as the main anniversary day on Sunday 6. Thank you to all the community volunteers who contributed to putting on this fantastic event. Approximately 180 people attended. The event commenced with a number of open days and historic displays at Murrabit's buildings – Golf Clubrooms, Recreation Reserve, T.A. Lornie Scout Hall, Tennis Clubrooms and Murrabit Group School.

Morning tea at the school was followed by speeches, storytelling, planting of a commemorative tree and unveiling of a plaque. Visitors than enjoyed lunch at the hall which was full of historic items, memorabilia and photographs. Vintage vehicles were also on display.

Lunchtime speeches focused on the history of Murrabit and District along with storytelling based around a 1924 Scribbling Diary which traced the journey of one of the British migrant settlers, Brian W. Cockell, enroute to Australia with his family on the T.S.S. Demosthenes. Arriving in Melbourne on 19 January 1924, the diary provides an insight into the first year of life in Australia for one of the settlers who came to Murrabit and District during 1924. The event was assisted by flood recovery funding provided as part of the Gannawarra Flood Recovery Program.

Murrabit as a Railway Town

The official opening of the Kerang-Murrabit Railway occurred on **20th December 1924.**

Imagine the excitement of that day when a big DD steam engine came rolling into town for the first time.

The train back then ran three times each week – on a Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

The roads were pretty crook, so the railway connected Murrabit and district people to Kerang and on through to Bendigo and Melbourne – for shopping, recreation, for getting produce to market, and to maintain connections with friends and family.

Once the Kerang-Murrabit rail line was open, the building of the bridge across the Murray River continued and four years after the opening of the railway here at Murrabit, the line opened through to the great metropolis of Stony Crossing in New South Wales.

Back when the railway was being constructed, equipment was pretty thin on the ground. The railway in the main was constructed by Clydesdale horse teams.

The men's wages to work on the line were about 15 shillings (or \$1.50 per day) and chaff for each horse costing 5 shillings (or 50 cents) per day with teams of 4-5 horses required.

The work was hard and tough. There was plenty of flood country between Kerang and Murrabit and formations of 1.8 to 2 metres required through this low lying, flood prone land.

There were also many creeks and irrigation channels to cross. On completion, there were 36 bridges between Kerang and Murrabit. The rail line was fully fenced and all crossings and directional signage in place.

The redgum sleepers for the line came mostly from the Barham/Koondrook Forests and were transported from Koondrook to Kerang via the Koondrook Tramways.

Sleepers had to be placed every 600mm, heavy steel rail in sections of 14 metres in length laid, spiked and bolted, between sleepers filled in with gravel ballast and packed down. An engine pushing rail trucks loaded with heavy materials would move slowly forward as the line was constructed.

When finished the train averaged 11.5 miles per hour (approximately 30 kms/hr). At top speed, it would take about an hour to get to Kerang – however....there was Westby Hill to traverse in the middle. There are stories recorded in our history books were passengers on the train had to alight and walk so that the train could gain enough traction to get up to the top of the hill. The passengers would then hop back on the train and continue their journey to Kerang!

For the official opening day on Saturday 20th December 1924, 700 people gathered to celebrate.

A parliamentary and official party arrived by special train, headed by a heavy DD steam engine.

The ceremony took place on the banks of the Murray River near where the bridge was under construction.

A blue ribbon was stretched across the line and Mr. Henry Angus M.L.A. standing on the tender of the engine, said that no more important work had been done for the State of Victoria than that accomplished under the Border Railway Agreement.

The ribbon was cut by Mrs. Angus and the 16 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles of line declared open for traffic.

The line, it was intended, would open up the rich Riverina to the Port of Melbourne.

A luncheon took place in two large marquees erected on the banks of the Murray River where the bridge was under construction. It was a gala occasion with many hundreds attending.

The Church of England ladies, who were raising money to build a church, catered both for the official party and for locals who came to see the ceremony. The original luncheon booklet for the event describes an extravagant banquet.

The menu: Poultry, Boiled turkey with ham, Roast gosling and apple sauce, Joints, Ox Tongue and ham, Horseradish sauce, Roast pork, Roast lamb with mint sauce

And for Sweets: Apple Pie and whipped cream, Raspberry jelly, Fruit salad, Trifles, Cheese straws, Fruit in season, topped off with Café Noir – a French black coffee (very fancy!)

Remember that this banquet, besides being on the banks of the Murray River, pre-dates the arrival of electricity to the district by 38 years, and it was on a hot December day!

From the 'meaty' main course menu, it would seem that there were a few less chooks, turkeys, ducks, cattle, pigs and sheep in the district after feeding 700 people at this event!

Stations along the railway line from Kerang were located at Westby, Myall and Murrabit.

At the time the district of Murrabit was an established farming area and becoming the largest citrus growing area in the southern hemisphere.

The first commercial production of citrus grown in Murrabit was transported to Echuca by paddle steamer then on to Melbourne by train. This was in the late 1800s.

Pioneering farmers wanted their own rail to transport produce more quickly and efficiently.

The line was originally known as the 'Gonn' line as it was first intended that the bridge would be located at Gonn Crossing, where an established settlement had developed and a public punt was running across the river, connecting New South Wales with Victoria.

A solid riverbed suitable for a bridge coupled with a straight enough reach for the river boats to line up and run the bridge, was however not found.

The bridge needed to be erected three miles upstream from the Gonn Crossing settlement. Hence, a new railway town known as Murrabit was surveyed.

Earlier in 1924 the British Migrant Settlers had docked in Melbourne on the 19th January. The building of the bridge over the Murray River had commenced on the 29th January, and the blocks in the new township of Murrabit were auctioned on 9th May.

The first sale of blocks in the newly surveyed township of Murrabit was conducted by Mr Arthur Kelly, on behalf of the State Rivers and Water Supply Commission, in Kerang. All 26 blocks sold at good figures.

There was great optimism for the future of this new railway town.

The Murrabit township was the last railway station on the Victorian side of the new Gonn railway extension and situated a little over a mile from the River Murray.

The set back from the Murray River was a requirement of the Victorian-New South Wales Border Railway Scheme.

Wool, livestock, firewood and citrus were transported south, and the local people had transport to Kerang and beyond.

The railway provided valuable service to Murrabit and district for thirty-seven years. The difference it made to the struggling lives of residents was tremendous.

Although the railway is long gone, the sturdy, all steel bridge over the Murray River remains a lasting legacy, and continues to connect residents on both sides of the river.

The above was one of the stories presented as part of the Centenary celebrations on 6 October 2024.
